PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT'S FOUR FREEDOMS SPEECH TO CONGRESS (1941)

This speech, delivered by President Franklin Roosevelt on January 6, 1941, became known as his "Four Freedoms Speech" due to a short closing portion in which he described his vision for extending American ideals throughout the world.

Very early in his political career, as state senator and later as Governor of New York, President Roosevelt was concerned with human rights in the broadest sense. During 1940, stimulated by a press conference in which he discussed long-range peace objectives, he started collecting ideas for a speech about various rights and freedoms.

In his 1941 State of the Union Address to Congress, with World War II underway in Europe and the Pacific, FDR asked the American people to work hard to produce armaments for the democracies of Europe, to pay higher taxes, and to make other wartime sacrifices. Roosevelt presented his reasons for American involvement, making the case for continued aid to Great Britain and greater production of war industries at home. In helping Britain, President Roosevelt stated, the United States was fighting for the universal freedoms that all people deserved.

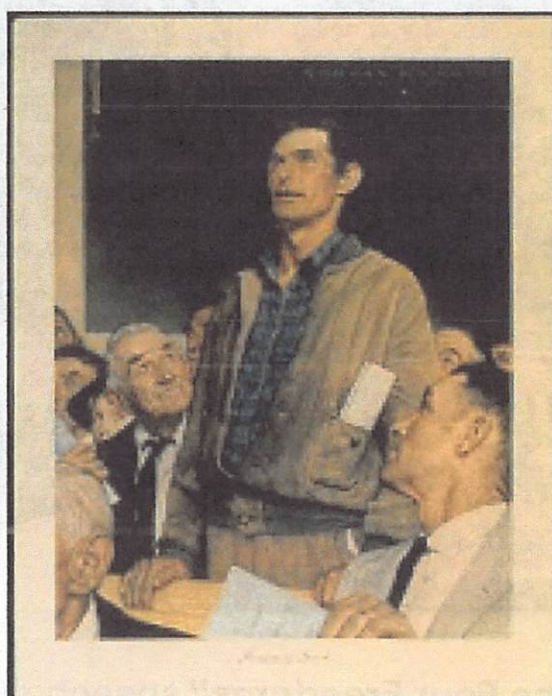
At a time when Western Europe lay under Nazi domination, Roosevelt presented a vision in which the American ideals of individual liberties should be extended throughout the world. Alerting Congress and the nation to the necessity of war, Roosevelt articulated the ideological aims of the war, and appealed to Americans' most profound beliefs about freedom.

In his Four Freedoms Speech, Roosevelt proposed four fundamental freedoms that all people should have. His "four essential human freedoms" included some phrases already familiar to Americans from the Bill of Rights, as well as some new phrases: freedom of speech, freedom of worship, freedom from want, and freedom from fear. These symbolized America's war aims and gave the American people a mantra to hold onto during the war.

As America became more engaged in World War II, painter Norman Rockwell created a series of paintings illustrating the four freedoms as international war goals that went beyond just defeating the Axis powers. In the series, he translated abstract concepts of freedom into four scenes of everyday American life. Although the federal government initially rejected Rockwell's offer to create paintings on the four freedoms theme, the images were publicly circulated when *The Saturday Evening Post*, one of the nation's most popular magazines, commissioned and reproduced the paintings. After winning public approval, the paintings served as the centerpiece of a massive U.S. war bond drive and went on a national tour to raise money for the war effort.

After the war, the four freedoms appeared again, embedded in the Charter of the United Nations.

Norman Rockwell's Oil Paintings Depicting "The Four Freedoms"



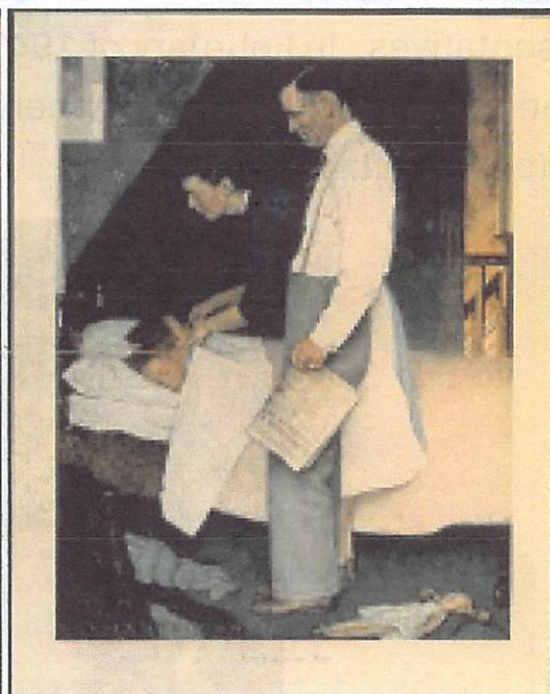

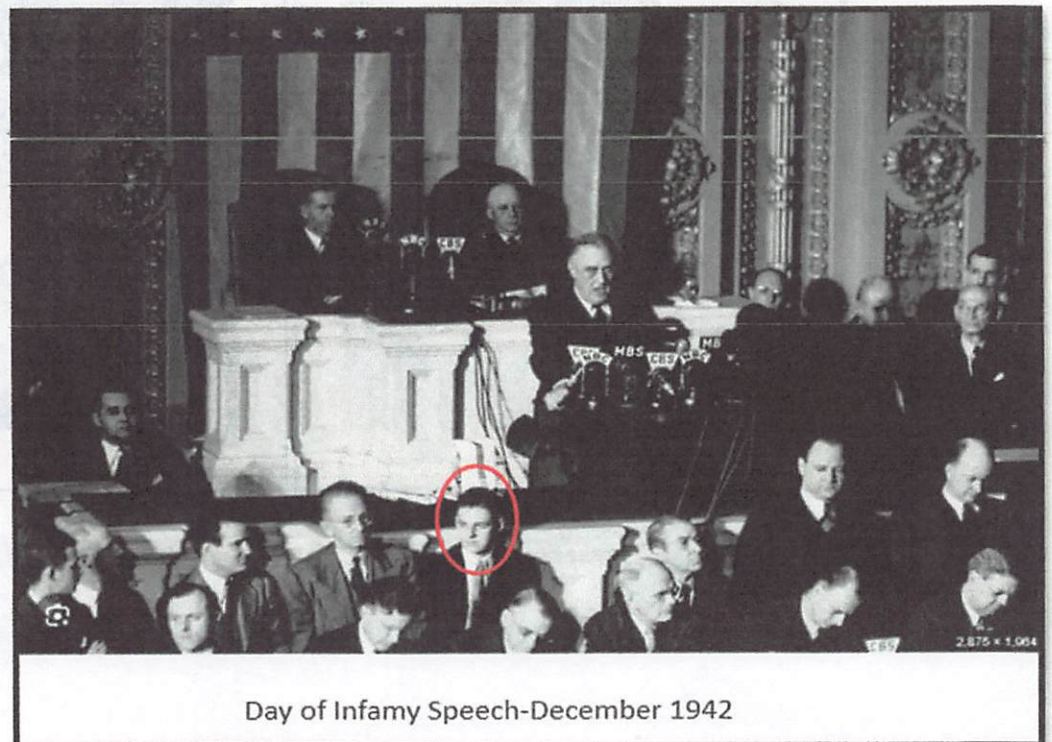

In February of 1942, Mr. Strachan enlisted in the Navy and served the US from 1942 to 1973, where he became a naval aviator and later, an aircraft carrier flight trainer.

WHO WE ARE

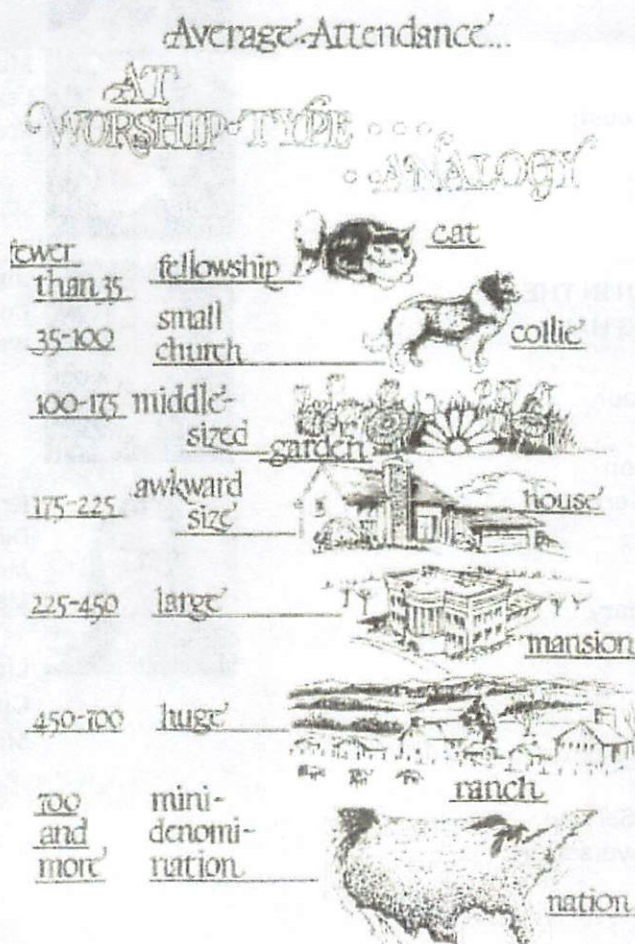

THE ELECTROMAGNETIC SPECTRUM

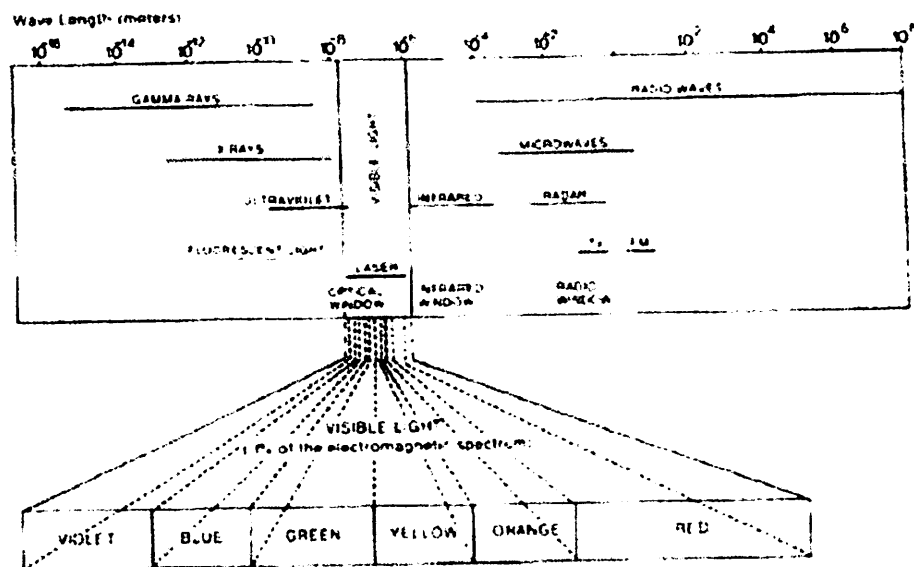

REMEMBERING SEPTEMBER 11, 2001

There are benchmarks in our collective American memories. Those of the Greatest Generation remember when they heard the news of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, plunging the nation into World War II.

Sixty years later another attack again marked our memory. We will soon observe the 25th anniversary of the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, in New York City, Washington DC and in nearby Shanksville, Pennsylvania.

Emerging out of these times of death and tragedy, are not only fear and tremendous loss, but also examples of heroism, miracles and opportunities for service.

On Wall Street just 200 yards from Ground Zero stands Trinity Episcopal Church with its St. Paul's Chapel nearby. Remarkably this chapel survived the day of destruction in almost perfect condition with only four damaged tombstones and a toppled tree in the churchyard.

Following that terrible day, police erected four portable toilets in the Chapel and began barbecuing on the front porch. It became a haven of rest and refuge for recovery workers at the site of the tumbled towers. Built in 1766, St. Paul's Chapel is the oldest public building in continuous use in New York City. George Washington worshiped there on his inauguration day.

During those dark days of autumn 2001, podiatrists used the "Washington Pew" to care for the feet of recovery workers. In other pews, chiropractors, counselors and massage therapists ministered to first responders. While on the second floor, psychiatrists counseled those experiencing extreme emotional stress.

Here also a High Bishop scrubbed the floor of the women's bathroom while "bluebloods" from Prescott Bush's family church volunteered alongside skinhead motorcyclists from California.

It may have been difficult to believe in miracles on that day, but if the airplanes had struck the Towers at lower levels, many more people in the buildings and on the ground would have perished. The "miraculous" survival story of Michael Hingston, a blind employee at the World Trade Center, tells of his trek down 78 floors to safety with his guide dog Roselle.

St. Matthew records: "... for he makes his sun to rise on the evil and on the good and sends rain on the just and the unjust" (5:45). Even the servants of the Lord in past tragedies and those of today naturally question: "Why? Why do bad things happen to good people?"

The answers are not easy nor forthcoming. We live our lives in the midst of pains and sorrows, but with Bible reading and prayer we discover that through God's mercy and the power of Jesus Christ we have been given a new birth into a living hope. In this we may rejoice even if, for a little while, we suffer trials, tribulations and injustice.

In our Westmont church family you will find many examples of help and concern for the distressed. Outside our building many members show care for their neighbors across the street and across the globe.

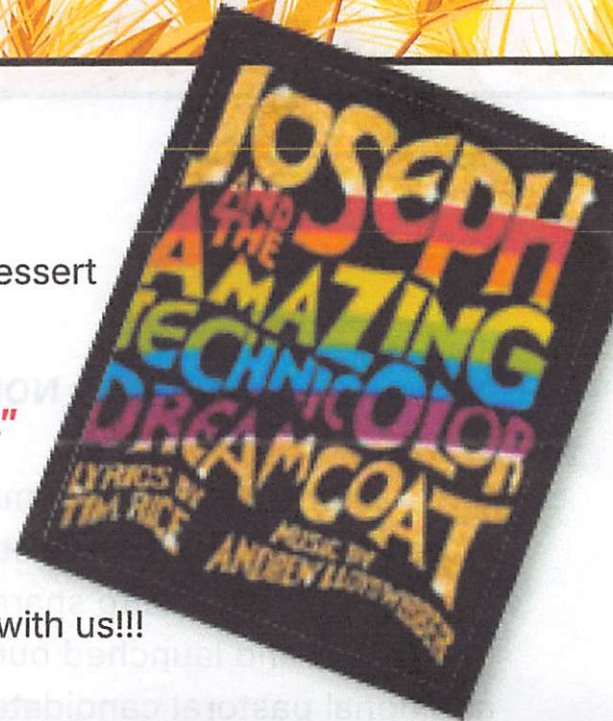

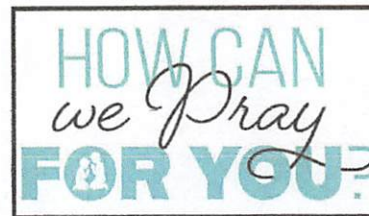

From the Kitchen of Dottie Glass!

Zucchini Apple Crisp

By Dottie Glass

Ingredients:

- 4 cups of flour
- 1 1/2 cups of sugar
- 3 sticks of oleo
- Dash of salt
- 8-10 cups of sliced, peeled, and unseeded zucchini
- 2/3 cup of lemon juice
- 1 cup of sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons of cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon of nutmeg



Directions:

For crust- Mix the flour, 1 1/2 cups sugar, oleo, and salt until crumbly. Press half of the mixture lightly on 9X13 pan. Bake for 10 minutes at 350 degrees.

For filling- Peel and remove seeds from zucchini and slice into 1/2 inch thickness. Combine zucchini with lemon juice, sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Place in saucepan and cook until the zucchini is soft and transparent. This will take about 20 minutes. Spoon onto crust and sprinkle remaining crust mixture on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes or until bubbly on top.

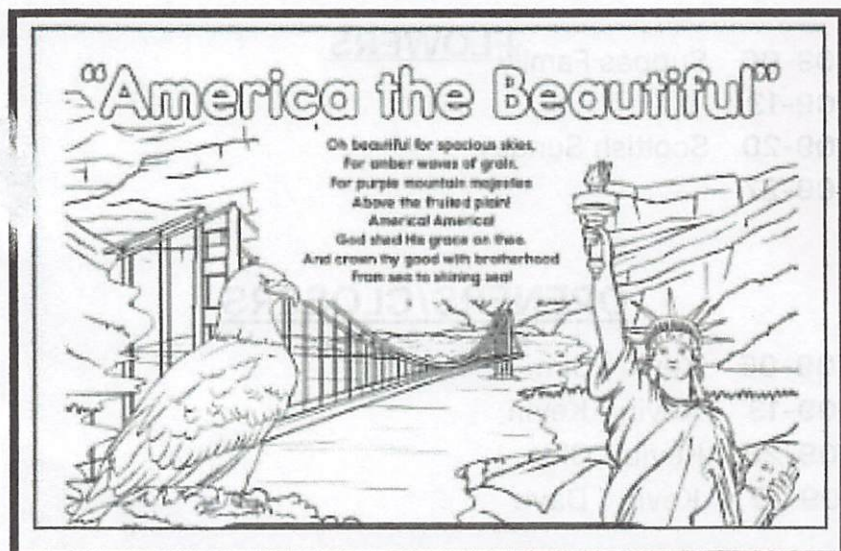
