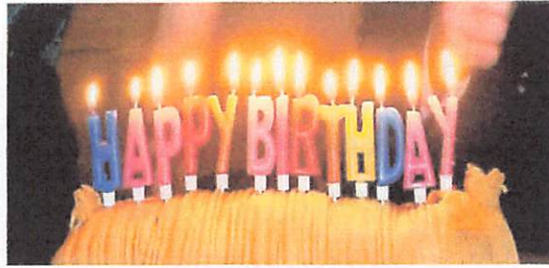

Palm Sunday will be a blessing for our congregation with the portrayal of the **Living Last Supper** by our **Chancel Choir and other church members**. The blessings will continue with a special **Fellowship Hour** by celebrating a **Seder Meal** provided by **Gretchen Lohr**. Other goodies are needed too, so if you would like to provide some pastries, veggies, fruit, munchies, etc. **please contact: Joyce Norris at 814-243-2659**.

What is a Seder Meal? The Seder meal is a symbolic, ritualistic meal that Jews observe on the first two nights of Passover to commemorate the Israelites' liberation from slavery in ancient Egypt. It includes specific foods on a Seder plate, the recitation of the Haggadah (a text that tells the story of the Exodus), and other traditions.

Here's a breakdown of the Seder meal:

Key Elements of the Seder Meal:

- **Seder Plate:** The Seder plate holds symbolic foods that represent different aspects of the Exodus story.
- **Zeroa (Shank Bone):** Represents the Passover sacrifice offered in the Temple.
- **Beitzah (Egg):** Symbolizes the festival sacrifice and the cycle of life.
- **Maror (Bitter Herbs):** Represent the bitterness of slavery in Egypt.
- **Karpas (Green Vegetable):** Dipped in salt water, symbolizing the tears shed during slavery.
- **Charoset:** A sweet mixture of apples, nuts, and wine, representing mortar used by the Israelites to build the Pharaoh's structures.
- **Haggadah:** The Haggadah is the text that guides the Seder, telling the story of the Exodus and prompting questions and discussion.
- **Matzah:** Unleavened bread, eaten during Passover to commemorate the Israelites' hasty departure from Egypt.
- **Four Cups of Wine:** A tradition during the Seder, symbolizing freedom and joy.
- **Other Traditions:**
- **Reclining:** Participants typically recline during the meal, a gesture of freedom.
- **The Four Questions:** The youngest person at the Seder asks the "Four Questions" about the significance of Passover.
- **Hidden Afikomen:** A piece of matzah is hidden and then sought out, adding a playful element to the Seder.
- **Food:** The Seder meal also includes other traditional foods, such as gefilte fish, matzo ball soup, brisket, and potato kugel.

Why is the Seder Meal Important?

- **Commemoration:** The Seder meal is a way to remember and celebrate the Israelites' liberation from slavery.
- **Education:** It provides an opportunity to teach children and family members about the story of the Exodus and the meaning of Passover.
- **Connection:** The Seder meal fosters a sense of community and connection among Jews.

Top student musicians in recital series

The Tuesday Noon Recital Series will resume in April with some of the area's best young musicians.

On April 8 the Johnstown Christian School Handbell Choir will play the program it has prepared for a tour in May. Its director is Kristen Lloyd.

All the recitals are at First Lutheran Church, 415 Vine Street, Johnstown.

Each program is followed by a light lunch. There is no charge because all costs have been covered by grants from the 1889 Foundation and Thrivent Financial plus individual donations.

On April 15 the recital series will present its annual concert by all-star jazz musicians from five area high schools: Central Cambria, Forest Hills, Greater Johnstown, Richland and Westmont.

The students play together for the first time in a rehearsal during the morning of the recital. They perform jazz classics from the Big-Band Era.

On April 22 members of the Irish band Kilronan will play fiddle tunes and other folk classics. Featured will be Carl Rahkonen, violin, and Terry Sabo, guitar.

Kilronan comprises smaller ensembles of the widely popular band Aran, which is named for islands near Galway Bay in Ireland. Kilronan is named after a village on one of the islands.

On April 29 HighStrung – whose members go by the names Smitty and Deese – will return for their sixth time in the 35-year-old series with a program they call “If It Ain’t Baroque, Don’t Fix It!”

Smitty and Deese play numerous stringed instruments and sing folk music and other works, in carefully crafted arrangements.

Reverend Jim Farrer presented a varied vocal program on April 2. He's a favorite and is always *most entertaining*.

On **Palm Sunday, we will present Ruth Schram's "Living Last Supper"** which we did 4 years ago. This will pair up our Chancel Choir, an orchestra, and members of the congregation as Disciples gather around the table with Jesus in the Upper Room. The disciples will share their inner most thoughts with monologues supported by the choral works. *This has been, perhaps, our most requested choral work in the time I have been with the church.*

March 9, celebrated "Woman Composer Sunday". All of the music for the service that day was composed by women, including a hymn by Fanny Jane Crosby composed in 1875, and a choral work by the iconic contemporary organist and conductor, Jane Marshall.

All of us from the Music Ministry look forward to seeing our members and friends each Wednesday and Sunday.

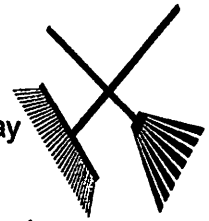

Preparing for Alaska On-Air and Online

Besides packing and beginning to amass cold-weather clothing, I'm also actively working on expanding my repertoire of on-air and online materials for Alaska. Many of you are familiar with my 90-second historical spots called *Weird News*. These bits of whimsical storytelling already air twice a day on KCAM and are well received. Based on their success, I am launching "Walking Wisely in a Wacky World," using these *Weird News* as a basis for a daily devotional feature.

Headquartered in Spartanburg, South Carolina, Denny's restaurants got their start as Denny's Donuts shop in Lakewood, California back in 1953. Over the next quarter century, they opened some 2000 eateries, known far-and-wide for being open 24/7. Until that day in 1988 when they suddenly weren't.

At 7 p.m. on Christmas Eve, all but 6 Denny's restaurants worldwide closed their doors, turned out the lights, and went home. Known as the Great Denny's Lockout, the idea sprang from a simple question: if management got Christmas Day off, why shouldn't the employees as well? Giving their 60,000+ workers the day off was estimated to have cost Denny's some \$10 million in revenue.

Denny's employees were ecstatic but shutting down the food service for the first time in 25 years posed its own unique problems. How do you turn off a kitchen that's been running hot and ready for 2½ decades? Where are the light switches? How do you set the burglar alarm? Do we even HAVE an alarm system?

The biggest challenge of all was finding the front door keys. Some restaurants didn't even have any door locks while others had keys long ago misplaced. Over 700 Denny's locations required new locks to be installed.

Isn't it great that Heaven doesn't close for Christmas? What a relief that God's Throne isn't open only from 9 to 5. How refreshing not to have our prayers met with the words "your prayers are very important to us; please stay on the line and our next available operator will be with you shortly."

Instead, we serve not only a God Who *hears* our prayers, but also *welcomes* them. We find His standing invitation in **Hebrews 4:16**: *Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need.*
